- > Teachers identify slow and advanced learners through oral questions, marks gained in previous class and organise orientation lectures guidance accordingly.
- There are 68 Fulltime teachers working in the institution (49 permanent faculties + 19 faculties working on non grant basis).
- ➤ The Student : Teacher ratio is 4592:68= 67.52
- > Teaching learning process-
 - Due to Covid-19 pandemic situation online lecture held up to February 2022
 - As per guidelines of Government of Maharashtra and university circular the offline lectures started in February 2022.
 - Faculty members organised various activities like internship, projects, article
 writing, essay writing, industrial visits, field visits for experiential learning,
 participative learning and used problem-solving methodologies-based learning
 process.
 - In science difficult concepts were visualised through online access to VLABS of IIT Bombay.
- > ICT utilization in teaching leaning process
 - o Online lectures were held by using Zoom application, Microsoft teams, Edfly,
 - o Teachers prepared their own PPTs, video lectures and used Google classroom to share notes in word and PDF format, to share video lectures, e-books, e-journals along with email id and WhatsApp group for communication.
 - Some of science practical were conducted virtually with the help of VLABS,
 IIT Bombay.
- > 68 fulltime teachers were allotted list of students for mentorship.
- > Academic calendar prepared in advance and displayed on website.
- > 42 full-time teachers are having Ph.D. degree.
- ➤ 17% of teachers have experience of more than 30 years of teaching and total teaching experience of full-time teachers in the same institution goes up to 1062 years
- > It took average 29 days for the declaration of results from the date of last semesterend/ year- end examination.

- ➤ Evaluation Process: In this academic year, we conducted examination under institutional autonomy for first and second year UG and PG courses. The continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) examination was conducted as per the statute accepted and approved by the Governing body and Academic Council, which is called Continuous Assessment (CA).
 - o The institution took COVID 19 lockdown situation as a challenge and conducted online Continuous Internal Assessment by using Google forms for odd semester, while in even semester offline examination was conducted through home assignments and scheduled tests.
 - o The SEE (Semester End Examination) was conducted at the end of both semester with the help of CIMS Master Soft ERP Solutions Pvt. Ltd in offline mode, odd semester examinations were held in February 2022 and even semester examinations in June 2022. The software assisted for various examination activities from allotment of seat number to declaration of results.
- > Results- UG 84.70% and PG 67.17%
- Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS) on overall institutional performance was carried though software provided by CIMS Master Soft ERP Solutions Pvt. Ltd, where more than 50% students responded the questionaries and they are 100% satisfied with institutional performance.

- Mr. Arjun Chaudhari is awarded with a fellowship for research under the scheme of Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Research Fellowship 2021 (MJRF-2021) of Rs: 21,000/- per month which is funded by Government of Maharashtra.
